Lichtundfire is pleased to announce and welcomes all to the Opening Reception of RIVERS OF BABYLON, a Solo Exhibition of Works on Paper by Panamanian artist RODNEY ZELENKA, jointly curated by curator Elga Wimmer and Lichtundfire's gallery director Priska Juschka.

This exhibition, with works in various media, emphasizes and comments visually on the universal and age-old human reality of GLOBAL MIGRATION. Deeply inspired by his own family history, and by his parents, separately immigrating from Germany and Austria to Panama in the 1930's — Zelenka's primary setting for his visual language is the context of South and Central American Migration. It refers to the seemingly endless migration streams coming across Central America, with some of them arriving in the USA after a perilous journey, and often after the loss of everything they left behind in the countries they may or may not call their homelands. The reality, and often subsequent tragedy, of migration is as old as human existence. *Rivers of Babylon* points back to and reminds us of the migration and plight of the Semitic tribes of Mesopotamia between the rivers of Tigris and Euphrates. Today, still, people from every region of the world leave their birth countries to escape and find opportunities in new territories fleeing

autocracies, famine, persecution or war, while others migrate to find economical opportunity as many were seeking at height of the Babylonian empire. Both, voluntary and involuntary migration, are part of the same phenomenon and subsequently the root cause of many conflicts, now and then.

Zelenka depicts the plight of the migrants with empathy, sincerity and, at times, ironically.

He mixes his visual metaphors, borrowing language and references both from contemporaries and predecessors who depicted oppression, displacement and war: Goya, Picasso, Rivera, Orozco, Siqueiros, Bourgeois, De Kooning, Guston and many others. We are reminded of Picasso's *Guernica* and Goya's *Sleep of Reason*, in Zelenka's own, original visual vocabulary. Cartoon style meets Surrealism. Pop is paired with Romanticism. Symbolism encounters Realism. Zelenka's mixed media works resonate with rich and tactile surfaces, with pins and gold leaf, in acrylic, oil pastel or watercolor. Prime colors, blue and red and yellow, emanate and reflect the richness of the topic and the depicted. Weapons and airplanes are shown side by side flowers, birds and spiders. Refugees cross rivers and territories. Piles and floods of human belongings turn (almost) into cosmic debris. We feel the weight of the charged narrative — historically, politically, ecologically and psychologically.

Unprepared, unequipped and without agency, migrants trade one dominion with the other — a realization by many that arrived at the shores of any new land.

Zelenka's visual symbolism is bountiful — and while his realism is often cynical, his humor is hopeful, forgiving and lyrical — a contemplation of the nature of the human condition, his works on paper reflect the richness of an amalgamate of emotions.
